Pearl Harbor sports five historic sites. The USS Arizona Memorial is the most popular, but Hawaii Tourism says the Battleship Missouri memorial, the USS Bowfin Submarine Museum & Park, the Pacific Aviation



Memorial are not to be missed. The Oueen Emma Summer Palace, once home to Hawaiian Royalty and cultural history museum Bishop Museum are also highly recommended.
