Whale Of A Time On New **South Wales's South Coast**

Just 90 minutes from Sydney is the coastal haven of Jervis Bay which lies amidst the national parks of New South Wale's South Coast region. A scenic and easy drive down Grand Pacific Drive takes you through the Royal National Park via the spectacular 665 metre Sea Cliff Bridge into this pristine coastal region, as famous for its marine life as it is its' laid back lifestyle. Visitors to the region will feel right at home amidst local seaside cafes, craft shops, spectacular seascapes and amazing marine experiences. These include seasonal whale and dolphin watching which can be enjoyed from May to November with jervisbaywhales.com.au. A range of cruises are on offer and around 2 hours duration. Don't forget to check out Hyams Beach – this 2 kilometre stretch of pristine white sand is claimed to be the whitest sand beach in the world and features highly in the top 101 best Australian beaches **101bestbeaches.com**





Tasmania's Natural **Treasure Island**

Bruny Island is close to Hobart it is almost criminal to miss one of the State's most incredible natural treasures. Just a short drive and a ferry trip from Hobart, Bruny is an easy self drive destination, or treat yourself to a seaplane flight from Hobart's waterfront to the natural wilderness of nearby Bruny Island with tasmanianairadventures.com.au. Bruny Island will feel like home to many kiwis, friendly locals, abundant marine life, sleepy seaside villages, but an exceptional ocean experience with one of Australia's most renowned eco-marine experts, Rob Pennicott of pennicottjourneys.com.au. Ningaloo Whaleshark Festival 24-26 May

Western Australia's Ningaloo Whaleshark Festival **ningaloowhalesharkfestival.com** celebrates the annual visitation to the region of these mighty ocean creatures. Considered to be the only event of its kind in the world, the Whaleshark Festival is held at Exmouth with festivities kicking off at $\underline{\text{novotelningaloo.com.au}}$. Visitors to the region and the festival can embark on a close encounter of the most magical kind and swim alongside the whalesharks with oceanecoadventures.com.au

Ningaloo Reef and Marine Park is regarded as one of Western Australia's "best kept secrets" and at 260km is the largest fringing reef in the world. The reef and its pristine waters host a unique marine eco system as well as hosting the giant, but gentle Whalesharks during their annual migration, when these enormous filter feeders stop to feast from April to July.



Splendour In The Grass –Byron Bay, NSW 26-28 July

Widely regarded as the 'holy grail' of camping festivals, 'Splendour in the Grass' is the Australia's most popular mid-winter festival. More more than 70 big names in local, international, alternative rock and indie music perform to an audience of around 18,000 people on a rural property in Byron Bay.
