Jay's **Top Five**

- Check out the Tavuni Hill Fort, a semi-restored ancient Fijian fort and archaeological site on a hill about 4km west of Sigatoka. A museum has displays including an underground oven which once contained human bones, and there are excellent views of Sigatoka and surrounding districts. Books or guides are available for a few FJD.
- Military buffs might like to visit the Momi Guns site, a now silent gun battery constructed by the New Zealand Expeditionary Forces during WWII to guard against any attack by the Japanese.
- The Biausevu Waterfall is a pretty two-tiered 20m waterfall, reached by a pleasant and mostly flat 30-minute jungle walk. Many resorts offer organised tours, or hire a car for the freedom of exploring further.
- Keen golfers shouldn't miss the chance to play a round at championship course Natadola Bay.
- The Coral Coast is synonymous with rugby so be sure clients plan to catch a game at Lawaqa Park stadium in Sigatoka.

Plenty To Do

Like the rest of Fiji, the Coral Coast is great for relaxation—but it is also packed full of activities, from cultural to soft adventure. Clients can jet-boat down the Sigatoka River to meet locals; try their hand at surfing, fishing, diving or snorkelling; go horse-back riding on the beach; hike out to waterfalls; walk through ancient sand dunes; or delve into the rich history and traditions of the region.

It's Not Too Wet!

One of the biggest myths operators try to combat from the New Zealand market is the perception of heavy rainfall in the area, says Whyte, who has only lost 20 days of business to rain in six years of trading.

The eastern region of Fiji certainly has its fair share of rain, but we are nicely positioned on the southern coastline of the main island of Viti Levu which enjoys great sunshine and a cool breeze all year round," says Whyte.

Best Beach In Fiji?

The Coral Coast is home to Natadola Beach, widely considered to be one of the best in Fiji—and the world. The white sandy beach with crystal-clear water stretches for 1.6km, meaning visitors are unlikely to be fighting for space. Off-shore, the reef forms a lagoon providing a safe environment for swimming in all tides.

Closer Than You Think

The belief that the coast is too far away may be one of the reasons people stay away-but it is only 66km from Nadi, around half an hour further than Denarau and closer than the Mamanucas. "Most Kiwis know that the best things usually are found a bit further afield and that is what makes them so appealing," says Whyte.

Boredom Is Simply

Not An Option

The Coral Coast is packed with things for the active traveller to do, and one of its great advantages is that everything is so close—clients can be fishing, diving, surfing and snorkelling in the open water or visiting locals in a Fijian village without having to travel for miles.

Adventurous clients might like to have a go

surfing at the mouth of the Sigatoka River, which is becoming increasingly popular with some great waves around the dunes (the best time is two hours either side of high tide). The mouth is also a great place to try your hand at fishing, says Coral Coast

Fantastic Diving

Coral Coast dive operators are blessed with only very short boat rides to fantastic dive sites where clients can experience a vast array of ocean life, including sea turtles, reef sharks and eagle rays, says Diveaway Fiji's Alice Hill. At certain times of the year, reef sharks will come to the area to birth their pups, and on occasion lucky divers can hear humpback whales as they pass. Most operators liase direct with customers, says Hill, but she suggests agents contact dive operators if they have groups.

Take A Jetboat Ride To Authentic Fiji

Fiji's original jet-boat safari, the award-winning Sigatoka River Safari takes clients on a half-day eco/ cultural adventure to visit traditional villages and experience a day in the life of a Fijian. Passengers are taught about the rich history, customs and legends of the area and treated to typical Fijian hospitality with lunch and dancing. For many of the villages the jet-boat safari is their first experience with tourism so clients should expect to see

truly authentic Fiji. They should also expect a bit of excitement with the jet boat driver demonstrating some gentle maneouvres on the river.

The river safari was started by Australian man Jay Whyte, whose love affair with the "real Fiji" began in 1991. He loves to share his passion with visitors, and it is not just limited to his safari business - Jay is the Coral Coast Coalition chairman and key in bringing the Coral Coast Sevens tournament to the region.

Getting out and meeting the friendly Fijian people is a must on any visit to the islands, and on the Coral Coast the best place to do this is Sigatoka.

Home to around 10,000 people, here clients can experience a true Fijian township only a short

The busiest and best time to visit is a Sat morning (avoid Sun as everything will be shut).

Grab A Bite



Children and adults alike will marvel at the collection of brightly coloured tropical birds, insects and local sea life at the park, which has been awarded the Excellence In Tourism Award as Fiji's best attraction numerous times. Make sure clients say hello to Baby, the Kadavu red-breasted musk parrot, and grab a photo with parrots and iguanas before heading off to explore the park. They will wander through the forest past native flora and fauna, past trees bearing strange fruit, nuts and flowers and listening to the calls of the unusual birdlife there.

The park plays a big part in conservation and offers free classes to Fijian children. It was recently involved in the captive breeding of Fiji's peregrine falcon and crested iguana. For more see fijiwild.com

Outrigger, which sponsors the local Nadroga Stallions, organises excursions to go and watch locals play in the domestic competitions when they are on.

While in town it's also a good idea to check out the Melrose Bridge, named after the Hong Kong Sevens trophy the year Fiji won.
