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Kuala Lumpur: Rich Past, Visionary Future

Kuala Lumpur is a city of contrasts and is one of Asia's most dynamic cities. The city began as a mining settlement in the late 1800s, but now has an impressive skyline including the world's tallest twin towers, the old Moorish railway station and numerous mosques, temples and churches.



There are many places of interest in Kuala Lumpur which can be accessed easily as distances between them are short, hence it is possible to discover the capital by foot. Alternatively organised tours and public transport heart of the city and surrounding areas.

Getting to Kuala Lumpur and Around

Kuala Lumpur Top Sights

- KLCC The heart of the city and among the highlights are the mesmerising Petronas Twin Towers, KL Tower with its 360 degree views and revolving restaurant and KLCC gardens which offers free water park areas for big and small kids alike!
- Butterflies, Deer and Birds Visit the three key parks in KL within the Lake Gardens. With over 2,500 birds flying freely, this is a great day excursion.
- History at every turn Kuala Lumpur has not forgotten its past and with buildings like the Sultan Abdul Samad Building and the Old Moorish Railway Station it is hard not to be swept away. A visit to Merdeka Square will leave you under the shadow of the world's tallest flag pole.

Kuching: A magnificent city full of surprises

There is something utterly fascinating and mystical about Sarawak and its capital is no exception. Kuching is an intriguing place to grab a glimpse into the past. Sarawak is Malaysia's largest state, covering an area of 124,450 sq km and is divided into eleven divisions with the city of Kuching as its heart in the southern corner.



Fondly known as 'Cat City' Kuching is located on the Sarawak River and its tourist belt is the waterfront and Main Bazaar which features old shop houses selling local pepper, artefacts, antiques and exotic forest products. The waterfront is a 900m long esplanade and can be explored on foot or on

one of the many river night cruises.

Kuching boasts many international-class hotels such as the Hilton Kuching, Pullman Kuching, Riverside Majestic Hotel and Grand Margherita Hotel, both are under renovation but still open throughout the process with no disturbance to guests.

Getting to Kuching and Around

Domestic Flights connect Kuching to Kuala Lumpur, Penang, Sabah, Indonesia, Singapore and Brunei. Air Asia and Malaysia Airlines offer low cost domestic fares to and from this city.

For those with a more leisurely schedule, boat rides are an exciting way of getting to the remote villages and national parks around Kuching and Sarawak.

Roads around Sarawak are tarmacked but can be hard to drive due to the terrain; hence a 4x4 is recommended. Roads are also not direct; hence a trip from Kuching to Miri can take up to 12 hours.

- · City Life Kuching has a diverse range of sights within its city centre. The Tua Pek Kong Chinese temple, Fort Margherita, Main Bazaar and India Street are just a few of the surprises this undiscovered city has to offer.
- Bako National Park This is ideal for day trips because of its proximity to the city. Among the residents here are the native Proboscis Monkey, Wild Boars, Longtailed Macaques, Leaf Monkeys, Monitor Lizards, Plantain Squirrels and about 150 species of birds.

Its verdant jungles are strewn with massive natural formations, the world's largest cave chambers as well as endemic flora and

- · Miri Malaysia's first Oil town. Visit Grand Old Lady - Miri's first oil well.
- Sibu Sibu's history is as the rubber merchant capital and was run by the Chinese who were encouraged by Charles Brookes to set up here. Due to this past Sibu has a 100 year old Chinese temple dedicated to the patron saint of merchants, Tua Pek Kong. Located on the waterfront it has a seven story pagoda with breath taking views.
- Gunung Gading National Park Go and see the gigantic Rafflesia flower which can reach up to one metre in full bloom.
- Iban Longhouse Tour No visit to Sarawak is complete without visiting a traditional Iban Longhouse. Here you can experience life in the past and are welcomed with Tuak, or rice wine, a meal and tour.
- Niah Caves National Park Considered by many to be the most important archaeological site in Southeast Asia, the Niah Great Cave and Painted Cave are a spectacular attraction and are declared as a National Historical

Mulu: Astounding natural attractions

One of the most outstanding attractions in Sarawak, Gunung Mulu National Park is a treasure trove of vertical cliffs, jagged limestone pinnacles and intricate cave networks.



The area is a paradise with some 20,000 animals and 3,500 plant species. It is Malaysia's first UNESCO World Heritage Site and Sarawak's largest national park. Its spectacular show caves, longboat river travels, and the mass exodus of wrinkled-lip bats (about three million at last count) in the evenings have lured witnesses from all corners of the world. If the synchronized flight performance by the bats doesn't thrill you enough, then braving the daunting Pinnacles trail will leave you literally breathless.

Tours and caving expeditions are available from the park office and are accompanied by World Heritage Guides. To truly appreciate the beauty of Mulu, visitors are advised to allocate at least several days for their trip.

Getting to Mulu and Around

The only way to get to Mulu is to fly. Flights run from Kuching to Miri to Mulu most days.

Once in Mulu there are only 2 accommodation options, The Royal Mulu Resort or the cabins in Mulu National Park. The

Royal Mulu resort will collect guests from the airport and drive them the 5 minutes to the resort. They can also drive guest to the Mulu National Park entrance for day tours and River cruises leave from The Royal Mulu Resorts jetty.



Designed in the style of ethnic longhouses, Royal Mulu Resort is built on wooden stilts, three metres above the ground. Linked by a series of wooden walkways, the resort stands on the banks of the Melinau River, in the midst of a breath-taking natural

The resort is currently under a major renovation to become the Mulu Marriot Resort and Spa, the first stage of completion will be in March 2013. Please see the images below on how the resort will look once completed.

A Unique Experience

Walk the Headhunters' Trail from the amazing Mulu Caves out to The Pinnacles and Limbang. This trail is named from the local indigenous people who used this route on raiding expeditions. It journeys from Mulu National Park, towards the Pinnacles and ends in the picturesque town of Limbang which is on the Limbang River, north of the park. The whole trail takes 3.5 - 4 hours.

Mulu Top Sights

- World record sites Mulu has 3 magical caves. Deer Cave has the largest cave passage in the world, Clearwater Cave is Asia's longest cave and the Sarawak Chamber is the world's largest cave chamber and can accommodate 40 Boeing 747 aircraft!
- USA presidential appearance A unique feature at Deer Cave is the formation which resembles the profile of Abraham Lincoln. No visit to these caves is complete without seeing this formation.
- The Pinnacles Gunung Mulu's signature attraction is the razor-sharp limestone spikes called The Pinnacles. A hike to these outstanding formations will take 3 whole days and is not for the faint
- Musical trees One of the most fascinating discoveries of Mulu is to ask your guide to show you how the trees make music. One simple, light tap results in the tree vibrating and making a fantastic sound. This music comes from the ants who live in the tree and when under attack join together to make this sound.





Langkawi: Intriguing Legends and Nature's Wonders

Langkawi is the jewel in the crown of Kedah. Made up of a 99-island Archipelago, this charming tropical isle boasts some of the region's best natural attractions. It is South East Asia's first GeoPark; a status accorded by UNESCO for its geological formations.



Most tourists agree that Langkawi's biggest attraction is its natural, undisturbed state. Rice fields with grazing buffaloes give the island its rustic appeal and a host of naturebased adventures await visitors to Langkawi. Go on a fascinating boat ride through the mangroves, experience the rare opportunity of feeding eagles, visit the large caves; roosting grounds for thousands of fruit-eating

bats. Alternatively, discover the rainforest or take the ride of a lifetime on the thrilling rainforest canopy adventure.

Visitors can take a self-guided walk to Seven Wells and swim in mountain pools or take the Langkawi Cable Car to the summit of Gunung Mat Cincang at 700m for a spectacular view of the islands on the Skywalk, including neighbouring Thailand.

Getting to Langkawi and About:

Malaysia Airlines, Singapore Airlines, MAS Wings, Air Asia and Berjaya Air all operate direct flights to Langkawi from Kuala Lumpur or Singapore.

Ferry services operate during daylight hours from Kuala Perlis and Kuala Kedah on the mainland to Langkawi with Langkawi Ferry Service. A one way ferry crossing costs RM\$18 and a return is RM\$36. Ferries also go to Penang from Langkawi so go for a day trip or overnight stop. The ferry takes 2 hours 45 minutes and costs RM\$60 for single trip or RM\$115 for a return. Ferries leave twice a day from Langkawi at either 2.30pm or 5.15pm. Return trips leave from Penang to Langkawi at 8.15am or 8.30pm.

On the way you will pass through Cameron and Genting Highlands Ferry services run from Penang to Langkawi at 8.15am or 8.30pm for an overnight stop. The ferry costs RM\$60 for a single trip or RM\$115 for a return and takes 2 hours and 45 minutes.
