Aviation Tackles Climate Challenge

Governments around the world are meeting in Montreal to try and agree on a plan to tackle carbon emissions from aviation, and it's likely to have implications for the industry—but they're inescapable, according to one expert.

Air New Zealand hosted a Sustainability Breakfast in Auckland this morning to discuss its progress since launching its Sustainability Framework last year. NZ boss Christopher Luxon and the chair of NZ's Sustainability Advisory Panel, Sir Jonathon Porritt, spoke on the importance of sustainability globally, and particularly to the aviation industry.

This week, ICAO is hosting a meeting to try and agree on a global scheme to offset carbon emissions in aviation, a significant contributor to the greenhouse gas problem.

As an industry heavily reliant on fossil fuels, aviation faces major challenges in how it can reduce emissions, says Luxon, who says NZ is 'very, very supportive' of introducing a global market-based measure such as the one being discussed in Montreal.

"Just announcing that we want to be carbon neutral by 2020 is lovely, but we have to do the work," he says. "It's really hard for our industry to solve that problem."

Biofuels are an option but a longterm one and not likely to be on a large enough scale to really tackle the problem; and major technological leaps in aviation come only every 20 years or so, with the Dreamliner the most recent.

Technology is a huge challenge for aviation—it can't do the equivalent of swapping a petrol-powered car for an electric one, says Porritt.

This leaves carbon offsetting (where emissions are counter-acted by an equivalent reduction in carbon dioxide, such as by planting trees), but this comes with consequences too.

. . . The Cost

"The amount of money involved to just deal with carbon neutral growth after 2020 runs into tens of billions of dollars," says Porritt. After achieving neutrality, there's a goal of reducing emissions, which would take an 'astonishing amount of money'.

As a result the 'world will see a transfer' where the wealthy may end up paying more, to the benefit of some of the poorer countries, who need help putting climate programmes in place. Although it might not start happening for another 10 years or so, 'this is going to be part of the deal for aviation', says Porritt-who adds that while some think it's 'scary', he believes it's necessary. "We're going to pay a more realistic price and in the process help the poor."

JO FlexiBiz Takes Off

The New Zealand market has accounted for almost half of all FlexiBiz fares sold since they were launched in New Zealand, Australia and Singapore, says Jetstar.

"Our new flexible fare appears to have hit a real sweet spot with Kiwi trade and business travellers," says JQ sales manager Mick Cottrell. "We launched FlexiBiz for sale in early Sep and in the first month the three key business routes between Auckland, Wellington and Christchurch have become the top performing FlexiBiz routes across all launch markets."

Most of those bookings are coming from corporate travel agents and TMCs, says Cottrell, who says the fares' popularity is 'confirmation that our early trade engagement and feedback was the right way to build this new business travel product.'

Vanuatu Runway OK?

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Mid-flight Orchestra

Passengers on a Qantas flight from Sydney to Singapore last week were treated to a pop-up concert, thanks to fellow passengers from the Australian World Orchestra. A nine-piece ensemble, including a French horn, snare drum, cello, flute, trumpets and saxophone serenaded everyone onboard with a live performance, arranged in partnership with Qantas. The performance was said to have taken place shortly after take-off, with nearly 300 passengers onboard.

LHR Protest, 'Die-in'

More than 100 people staged a 'die-in' protest at London's Heathrow Airport on Sat (local time) to highlight the impact of air travel on climate change and pollution levels. Reports say the protest, in which many donned white masks and lay on the ground in Terminal 2, was also timed to coincide with the government's upcoming decision on where a new runway will be built. The decision is set to be made in mid-Oct, with both Heathrow and Gatwick airports on the cards; with Heathrow reportedly set to comply with an extended ban on night flights as well as meet European air quality rules if the project gets the go-ahead. The airport operated as normal during the protest.

Airberlin Restructure

Airberlin is set to restructure its business, in which up to 1200 positions will become redundant and it will focus its core operations on serving higher-yielding markets from its two key hubs in Berlin and Dusseldorf. Its core operations will be served by a fleet of 75 aircraft from (northern) summer 2017, with its profitable long-haul programme to be expanded with new routes and frequencies. Its short- and mediumhaul programme, in addition, will concentrate on year-round business markets with a strong focus on Italy, Scandinavia and Eastern Europe. Meanwhile, its leisure flying will be combined into an independently operating touristic-focused business unit; and it is set to provide up to 40 A320 family aircraft to the Lufthansa Group to employ excess aircraft and crew capacity.

QF, Airbnb Partnership

Qantas and Airbnb have partnered in a move that will give QF Frequent Flyer members the chance to earn QF Points when booking Airbnb accommodation through qantas.com. Members will receive one QF Point for every dollar they spend on any Airbnb listing, and it's come at a time when the way people plan, book and experience travel is changing rapidly, says QF's Alan Joyce. "We know many of our customers are just as likely to arrange an Airbnb as they are to book a hotel, and we wanted to recognise and reward them for that," he says.

However, not everyone is happy, with Tourism Accommodation Australia saying the partnership is a 'slap in the face' for traditional hotel partners. "While we respect the right of airlines to make commercial agreements with various organisations, QF should understand the importance of working with partners who fully support and contribute to the tourism industry and meet all their regulatory requirements," says TAA chief executive Carol Giuseppi.

Tourism To Benefit Countries In Crisis

Increased cooperation between tourism source markets and destinations that have been affected by crises is needed to ensure affected countries recover, says UNWTO secretary-general Taleb Rifai.

Speaking at the Summit of the Federal Association of the German Tourism Industry, Rifai says supporting these countries will benefit the whole tourism sector and the whole of society.

Am. Samoa Schedules

Polynesian Airlines (OL) and Talofa Airways (TA) have released their new flight schedules for travel between Samoa and American Samoa, says the American Samoa Visitors Bureau. OL's new schedule (valid 25 Sep-31 Oct) will see a total of 59 return flights between Fagalii Airport and Pago Pago International Airport, as well as four return flights a week PPG to Fitiuta Airport (FTI) on Ta'u Island and one flight a week PPG to Ofu Airport (OFU) on Ofu Island. TA's new schedule is valid 24 Sep-15 Dec with a total of 56 flights per week FGI to PPG and seven flights a week from Faleolo International Airport (APW) to PPG.

Rifai adds that coordination, information sharing and communication mechanisms between tourism and security will lead to safer and more seamless travel, as well as better crisis management.

SA: All-Time High

An AUD608 million, 11.4% increase in tourism revenue year-on-year to Jun, has pushed South Australia's visitor economy to an all-time high of AUD5.9 billion, reports Tourism Research Australia. The data shows domestic expenditure has grown by AUD439m to AUD5b, while international expenditure has increased by AUD170m to reach AUD944m since Jun last year. International and domestic visits have also increased, up 9.5% to 422,00 and 7.7% to 6.1m respectively.

Air New Zealand Goes Electric

Air New Zealand has revealed plans for all of its company cars to be electric by the end of the year, as part of its efforts to build a more sustainable business.

A year on from the launch of its Sustainability Framework, chief executive Christopher Luxon outlined NZ's progress at a breakfast in Auckland this morning.

Air NZ has an ambition to build one of the most sustainable airlines in the world, said Luxon this morning, and it's very proud of what it's achieved so far over the last year—but there's still a long way to go.

Highlights have included signing up around 80% of its supplier spend to a code of conduct which outlines things like human rights and ethical sourcing; and with the announcement of the new electric vehicles, NZ is issuing a challenge to other corporates, and eventually the government, to follow suit.

The carrier also announced today an expansion of its partnership with the Department of Conservation, with three new conservation initiatives on three of the country's Great Walks—the Heaphy Track, the Whanganui River Journey and Lake Waikaremoana. The projects are an expansion of the Air New Zealand Great Walks Biodiversity Project.
